

  - What questions do you have concerning this issue?


#### course consolidation

-epistemologically, rhetorically, and spiritually humble

-protective, comparative, & imperative claims

### ingredients for good apologetics

#2 Acuity

- -"And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight" (Philippians 1:9)
- -The privatization of religion and the refusal to offer a sound apologetic countering alternative truth claims have produced "fuzzyminded and listless Christians, who care very little about what is to be believed. ... It is a degenerate offspring of authentic Christianity" (Avery Dulles).

#3 Love

-insular, attacking, or embracing
